Practical Tips for a Biosecure Tack Room

1. Cleaning and Disinfection:

- **Regular Schedule:** Establish a routine cleaning and disinfection schedule. This should include sweeping, dusting, and disinfecting surfaces regularly.
- **Appropriate Disinfectants:** Use equine-safe disinfectants that are effective against a broad range of pathogens. EBG disinfectant can be sprayed onto your horses bit and left without having to wipe it off!

2. Equipment Management:

- **Dedicated Equipment:** Ideally, each horse should have its own set of tack and grooming equipment. If this is not possible, thoroughly clean and disinfect shared equipment at least once a week. Labelling items can help so you know which horse it belongs to.
- **Storage:** Store tack properly on racks or in containers to prevent contamination from dust, rodents, and insects.
- **Fabric Items:** Regularly wash saddle pads, blankets, and wraps in hot water with detergent, you can use EBG disinfectant in your washing machine.
- **Quarantine:** Always quarantine new equipment before introducing it to the tack room. Disinfect anything second-hand before using.

3. Hygiene Practices:

- **Hand Hygiene:** Practice good hand hygiene. Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water before and after handling tack or horses. You can use EBG multi purpose spray for hand hygiene.
