EVERY DROP COUNTS

Water is going to become an increasingly precious commodity in the UK by 2030, and is essential for horse welfare

- Install rainwater harvesting for washing tack and watering plants
- Install limiters on taps or just turn them off when full!
- Fix leaks and consider arena surfaces with low watering requirements



Never restrict drinking water for your horse



GROOMING PRODUCTS

Use refillable, natural grooming products and brushes, to reduce pollution from plastics and toxins and to reduce waste.



FEED & BEDDING

Source hay, feed & bedding from local, sustainable farmers and suppliers. Look out for regenerative farming methods and suppliers who will collect the packaging from you for reuse or recycling.



TACK

Look after and regularly clean tack & equipment to prolong its life. Aim to buy products made from natural fibres instead of synthetic/plastic. Buy from suppliers who will repair your tack for you.

GO PLASTIC FREE



- Opt for natural materials for tack and clothing
- Buy plastic free packaging options, or refillable containers
- Refreshing your arena surface? Opt for an all-natural surface and ditch the shredded carpet!



Have bins for recyclable and non-recyclable waste, based on how your local council separates & collects waste.



Reduce your waste by reusing, repairing or re-selling items before considering throwing them away.
